

21st Master Woodworkers Show Update

Well, it's a waiting game now. The Call to Entry has gone out, we've been in touch with our fellow guilds in the area and they have put it in their newsletters. We have visited other guilds and given presentations about the show. And we've sent out emails to every one of the makers who asked to be informed about the show. Now we just need to wait and see what comes in. We do hope you have all been in the shop working on your masterpiece for the show.

Perhaps this would be a good time to go over the process of entering a juried show. If you have never entered a juried show before now, this is a good one to see how it's done. First you visit the website and download, or call the show staff and have them send you an application. The first part of the application is the standard stuff, name and address, that sort of thing. Next is the artist biography. If your piece/pieces get into the show this is the bio that will be seen by the public, posted next to your work (usually written in third person and a good rule here is to be brief and not to take yourself too seriously). Next you get to read all the rules, nothing too scary here just what we need to do to keep everything equal for everyone and make the life of the show committee a bit easier. Now a note on rule #5; if you take a picture with a digital camera it will be a jpeg image and it will most likely be at least the size we ask for, so don't worry. Now if you want to be really nice you would rename the pictures file name with your name and the submission number (but you don't have to). Next is page 2 and that's where you give us the particulars about each piece. A couple of notes on this stuff. The description of the piece is like your bio; this is what the public will see next to your work. On the "sale price", your piece does not have to be for sale. You can just circle "not for sale" but you still need to put a price of the work down. If the work is NFS we will not post the price but we still need it for insurance reasons. That's about it. Just make sure you sign and date and get it in the mail or email it by August 1st. If you have any question just call Scott DeWaard at 865-681-4798, and he will do his best to help.

What happens after you send in your Application

This is where we get to see all the great work submitted and put them into a slide show. We take your pictures and add some information like the size, materials used and maybe some of your description if is helpful to understand the piece. Everything the jurors need to understand the piece, except the name of the maker or his bio. Nothing to indicate who made the piece is included. The job of the jurors is to select the pieces for the show only on the merits of the work itself. The jurors do have one other thing to consider. We need to tell them how many pieces we can fit into the gallery. This is sometimes where it gets difficult, as great the Emporium Building is for the show, we can only show so many pieces. Sometimes work we would like to show ends up being cut simply because we don't have the room. This is the tough job of the jurors, and why we on the show committee are grateful to them; it's not an easy job.

After that we send out the letter to the makers and let them know the outcome of the juror's selections. Then we get to start to work again laying out the show and getting the word out to the public.

Volunteers Needed

Of course, as the host of the show, there are more ways to participate than showing your work. At the September Guild meeting we will be asking for volunteers. We need door greeters, help in setting up the show, helping makers unload and load up after the show and other needed activities. Denny Siemsen and Sandy Pittard are this year's volunteer coordinators and we hope to get as many guild members involved as we can. Sharpening Classes

Two sharpening classes were held in June at my workshop. After the signups were registered for the single intended class on June 3, there was a waiting list. Rather than risk having injured wood all over the place, we decided to teach a second class, which took place two weeks later, June 17. Each class took about six hours and each had five students.

The classes covered sharpening plane blades, chisels, spokeshave blades, and scrapers. Other tools were touched upon as they came up in discussion or questions. The mornings were used for demonstrations and explanation of principles; the afternoons got everyone involved in sharpening dull tools. Differences in effort and results when using sharp vs dull tools became clear. We covered sharpening methods, honing guides, types of stones and abrasives as well as how to avoid common pitfalls. Recommendations were made on what is needed in a sharpening kit to achieve fine results. The labeling and advertising for abrasives encountered when buying sharpening stones can be convoluted and confusing. We tried to simplify the nomenclature, for example, by giving tables correlating "grit" to abrasive particle size within the several different systems and by describing the different materials used in sharpening stones.

Juried Membership

In perusing the membership contact list, you will notice that about one in five is designated as having juried status. The term denotes the highest level of achievement in woodworking, as rated by a jury of the most accomplished woodworkers within the Guild. Juried members serve as a resource, who can be consulted on a wide range of questions ranging from design, to specific techniques, tools and methods. To seek juried status a member may request that their work be evaluated. To help decide whether work is ready to be considered by a jury, it is recommended that you start with self-evaluations. First, do your pieces meet your own highest standards? Be honest and critical. Second, as objectively as you can, compare your pieces to recognized works of merit. Examples may be those displayed at the ETWG Master Woodworkers Shows, at national shows generally acknowledged to highlight the finest furniture and woodwork, and within highly distilled magazines like Finewoodworking. If your work does not do well by comparison, in your judgement, then delay your request to be juried. Make some improved pieces based on what you have learned. If you are ready to take the leap, contact Lou Mansur our ETWG standards committee chairman mansurlk@comcast.net.
