Details on the classes and instructors (Brian Fireman in furniture and a collection of talented local turners), additional activities, and attendance cost will be posted on the ETWG website as soon in January as finalized (this week).

Unfortunately, Jim Scarsella who was to teach a one-day class on surface embellishment on turnings has had to withdraw because of an unavoidable conflict. A new program for turning on Saturday to replace Jim has been developed (good job Sandy Pittard and others).

Brent and Tom presented information about a class they took at Arrowmont as recipients of the Rick Mcgill scholarship. The class had 10 students and was taught by Andy McFate.
