

East Tennessee Woodworking Guild Survey Results

Date of Survey: May 6, 2011

Number of Guild Members surveyed: 44

Key Points of Survey:

- Input from members
- Provide training/educational programs to meet member's request.
- Develop one/two year outlines for continuity
- Collect survey results and share results to members.

Results of survey based on "High" desirability.

1. Design:

Shapes

- Straight line, taper, curved edge treatments.
- Proportioning golden rectangles and golden ratio, classical orders (Doric, Ionic and Corinthian) geometric

Structural Considerations

- Carcass, drawers, hinge placement, grain orientation, humidity.
- Turned objects, bowls.
- Jointing: solid wood, dovetails, tenon, dowels, box biscuits, screws.
- Material Selection: Species of wood.

Forming

- Measuring and marking, repeating.
- Rough to finish material preparation.
- Allowing for internal stresses and relaxing after machining.
- Routing with and without table.
- Turning Use of lathe
- Bench work -- Chiseling.
- Hand Planes: Selection, use, sharpening, block, smoothing, rabbit, etc.
- Veneering
- Inlaying
- Carving
- Sanding

Assembly

- Sequence
- Fastening
- Mechanical tenon (with or w/o wedge or pin)
- Clamping

Finishing

- Preparation
- Applying Finish

Repairs

"How I Became Interested In Woodworking"

My Dad and 5 brothers were handy when it came to building things like work sheds, saw horses, and even rabbit boxes. My first wood working lesson came from my uncle Alan. He taught my cousin and me how to build a rabbit box with hand tools. Afterwards there were many old abandoned houses in the area which were missing old heart pine boards used in the construction of----; you guessed it---- rabbit boxes. At one point I had over a dozen rabbit boxes and yes; I caught and ate lots of rabbits.

In high school I signed up for wood shop which was taught at another school in the county. This would have resulted in spending the majority of my week in shop and not attending regular classes. When my parents learned what I had done, they forbid me from taking shop. While disappointing, this minor setback did not dampen my interest or desire to do wood working. When I saved enough money working after school and during summer breaks I purchased my first power tool a Sears's radial arm saw which is in my shop today.

Since barn wood was plentiful my next wood working project was to build barn wood picture frames. Sadly, neither the rabbit boxes or barn wood picture frames have survived for me to bring to show and tell, but the memories of those times are still fresh in my mind.

Some would look at my work now and say I haven't progressed much past those early days, and they might be right. But my love of the craft and inspiration derived from members in our guild keep me excited about starting each new project. Hey! If anyone needs to reduce their rabbit populations see me for a lesson in building rabbit boxes.
